A MESSAGE FROM OUR TOP DOGS

Don't forget to keep your furry friends hydrated with plenty of fresh water. It's crucial for their health, especially as temperatures start to rise. Always remember to pack water and a drinking vessel with you on your outings.

Our kennel hands and dogs are absolutely loving the warmer days, but as nature wakes up, we need to stay vigilant about the potential for snakes in our area. We have already encountered snakes during our kennel walks recently.

Please be extra cautious while out on your walks. Keep an eye on the ground ahead and encourage your dog's curious nose to stay out of bushes and tall grass where snakes may be hiding.

Let's keep our dogs happy and healthy while we all soak up the sun!









\$\$\$\$ THE REAL COST OF RESCUE

Behind every happy adoption photo, there's often a much bigger story. For many of the dogs who come into our care, it's not as simple as a routine sterilisation and vaccination. Some require extensive, and very expensive, medical treatment before they can even think about finding a forever home. From the moment a dog comes into care, we take full responsibility for their health and wellbeing. That starts with vet checks, vaccinations, flea/worm treatments, microchipping, sterilisation, and sometimes emergency surgery. On average, vet care alone costs us \$550–\$600 per dog, and more if there are complications. Some dogs stay just a few weeks. Others remain with us for months due to medical or behavioural needs. And with over 30 dogs in care at any given time, those daily costs stack up quickly.

BEYOND RESCUE: GIVING DOGS THE CARE

THEY DESERVE

Take Jamie, a 16 month old Poodle, who needed major hip surgery costing well over \$6,000. Then there's Marceline, who has been with us since she was a tiny pup. Now nine months old, she is still under specialist care as we wait for her to finish growing before her surgical options can be assessed. Her vet bills have already climbed into the thousands.



Our French Bulldogs, Louie and Sasha, have both undergone Brachycephalic Obstructive Airway Syndrome (BOAS) or reconstructive surgeries at a cost of several thousand dollars.

Meanwhile, our older small breed rescues like Sharni, Bella, Roxy and so many others, almost always require dental procedures before they're ready for adoption. These range between \$1,200–\$2,500 per dog, depending on the level of neglect.







Lets not forget our entropion surgeries, Milo is our most recent candidate. Left untreated, this painful eye condition can lead to blindness. Surgery is essential but costs rescues thousands of dollars. It's a reminder for owners to research breed-related health issues. Some dogs pay the price when this is overlooked.

Although we have done all we can for Milo, she has permanent damage to her eye, thankfully it should not impede her vision and she has a bright and clear, pain free life ahead.



Sadly, many of these medical challenges could have been avoided if the original owners had kept up with their dogs' health care over the years and if new owners did their research on breeds and their needs, along with ensuring breeders are checking for things such as hip issues.



MEET KASH, DOG NUMBER 1000 IN THE BARRC FAMILY.




We kept his arrival a little secret as Kash came into care, a very unwell little pup who needed some extra love and attention before we could introduce him to the world.

Jimbo came into BARRC's care in June, a timid and scared little boy, he slipped out of his harness and vanished as he was being transferred to his foster care home. What followed was 19 long days on the run, through cold and miserable weather, late night drives, and many kind hearted community members keeping an eye out for him.

Jimbo proved to be clever and cautious, never straying far, but always staying just out of reach.

Sightings trickled in from around the region and just the night before he was captured, Jimbo had been sighted around 20km away from Bunbury, where he was eventually found. While walking her dogs near the Boyanup townsite, Joanne's dog alerted her to a small creature curled up in the bushes. At first glance, Joanne thought it was a sadly deceased cat... until a pair of familiar ears pricked up from behind the shrubs. Quick-thinking and calm, Joanne slipped a lead over Jimbo's head before he even realised what was happening.

She immediately took him to the vet for a microchip scan, then home for warmth, food, and a well-earned rest.

The relief across the team was enormous. For Jimbo, this marked the beginning of a new chapter. One filled with safety, a warm cosy bed, regular meals and the love he deserves.

Once he was fully recovered from his adventure, he was prepared for adoption and has found the perfect home where he receives extra special attention every day.

We are incredibly grateful to everyone who helped in the search and to our volunteers who refused to give up hope. Jimbo's story reminds us of the resilience of dogs, the importance of community, and just how far we will go to ensure every dog is given their chance at a better life.
