RESCUE MONTH HAS OFFICIALLY WRAPPED UP AND WHAT AN OUTSTANDING MONTH IT WAS!

SavourLife donates 50% of its profits to pet rescue organisations, helping to rehome over 10,800 dogs and contributing more than \$1,250,000 in donations to date.

During Rescue Month, Petbarn and SavourLife join forces to raise funds and awareness for pet adoption.

Over the past three years, their combined efforts have led to the rescue of 1,149 puppies. In March 2024, in collaboration with 40 rescue groups, they successfully saved 432 puppies. Wait and read the results from this year, BARRC did amazing stuff!

The initiative also includes in-store adoption events at various Petbarn locations, including Bunbury, where BARRC held "Meet The Adoptables".

These events were perfect to allow potential adopters to meet our BARRC dogs and provide an opportunity for the public to engage, talk and cuddle, as well as learn more about the adoption process.



By purchasing SavourLife products at Petbarn stores during Rescue Month, customers not only provide their dogs with high-quality food but also support the rescue and rehoming of abandoned dogs.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR TOP DOGS

We can't believe that it is now April. Where have the last three months gone? This period has been particularly demanding with several dogs in our care that have had medical issues requiring significant surgeries. Each of these cases have cost anywhere from \$1000 to \$5000. As a not-for-profit organisation, we depend on support and donations from the community to assist in these situations. BARRC is partnered with multiple veterinarian clinics in the Bunbury region, as well as in Perth, the greater Southwest and Great Southern areas. Without their support, guidance and expertise, we would not be able to offer the best care for all our dogs. We are very pleased to report that all of our surgery dogs have had exceptional outcomes and now have bright, happy future's ahead.

There remains a significant number of dogs needing rehoming through district shires or private surrender. BARRC, along with other dog rescues, continues to receive high volumes of intake requests and operate at near full capacity. This has led to a shift in focus to prioritising dogs on euthanasia lists in shire pounds. Some of the dogs we have taken in literally only had hours left to live.

It goes without saying that rehoming a pet is an emotional experience. We strive to be compassionate, understanding, and respectful, acknowledging that some individuals may become upset when we are unable to assist. We ask that if you are in this situation, please remember BARRC is made up solely of unpaid volunteers (with busy lives) who give up their extra time to help.

We encourage people to consider adopting a pet from a shelter or a foster-based rescue organisation like us at BARRC. Furthermore, reaching out to local rescues about fostering a pet in your own home can help alleviate the burden on the waitlists for much needed assistance. 


FROM HOMELESS TO FAMOUS: SCRAPPY'S JOURNEY.

The Reality of Surrendering Dogs to Rescue

At BARRC, we understand that life can change unexpectedly, making it difficult for some to keep their dogs. While we strive to help, we do not have a shelter. Our rescue relies entirely on volunteer foster carers. This means every dog must be carefully assessed before being placed in the community.

We Can't Take Every Dog

Many assume rescues can take in every dog, but our capacity is limited by foster homes and the need to prioritise pound dogs at risk of euthanasia. Each dog requires assessment, vet care and support to ensure a successful future.

The Importance of Training & Socialisation

A major challenge is finding homes for dogs without training or socialisation. Many surrenders involve behavioural issues that could have been avoided with early training, exercise and enrichment. While we work with trainers, we can't fix every issue that stems from a lack of care.

When Surrender is Necessary

Some situations, like illness or financial hardship, make surrender unavoidable and we assist when resources allow. However, we urge owners to take proactive steps in training and socialisation to prevent unnecessary surrenders.

The Costs of Rescue

Taking in a dog requires time, effort and financial resources, from vet care to supplies like food, beds and crates. We also invest in training for our carers to ensure the best outcomes.

What You Can Do

Before surrendering, explore alternatives. Could training or a behaviourist help? If surrender is the only option, please contact us with as much notice as possible to allow for proper planning.

Rescue is a community effort. By prioritising responsible pet ownership, we can reduce the number of dogs needing rescue and give them the best start in life.

Stories from Vallies


Jayde is one of our kennel volunteers and has made a significant impact at BARRC. At just 18 years old she has a Certificate II in Animal Studies and a genuine love for animals. Jayde's journey into rescue began with her deep love for all dogs. "I specifically chose to volunteer with BARRC because I adore all types of dogs," she says.

One of the most rewarding parts of her experience is seeing the dogs find their forever homes. "Seeing the dogs get adopted and finally receive the love they deserve is incredibly fulfilling," she shares. Knowing that she's helped transform their lives is what motivates her to return week after week.

Among the many dogs she's cared for, one dog, Sunny, stands out. "Sunny had a funny personality, and we formed an amazing bond," Jayde recalls. Sunny, a large mastiff cross, spent four months at BARRC. Through the work of our volunteers, Sunny received the training and care he needed to find his forever home. Volunteers like Jayde play a crucial role in rebuilding trust with these dogs, who have often been let down by humans. "I didn't realise how many animals need care or how many are mistreated," she admits. This realisation has fuelled her passion for advocacy, and she is determined to raise awareness about the importance of responsible pet ownership and rescue work.

For anyone considering volunteering in animal rescue, Jayde has some simple advice: "I would highly recommend it because it gives you great satisfaction and is very rewarding. The joy of helping animals and being part of their journey to a better life is truly fulfilling".

Fix-it Friday

Our dogs come in all shapes, sizes, colours, and personalities. Some are fit and healthy, while others have health issues that need assessing. We often quietly care for these dogs, and they are adopted just like any other member of the BARRC family.

However, we decided to share with you some of the stories, challenges, and unique personalities that make these amazingly resilient dogs so special, and created "Fix-It Friday where we share some of their stories on our Facebook page. Here are just a few



This is Louie.

He struggles to breathe.

Decades of selective breeding have led to this. Louie suffers from Brachycephalic Airway Syndrome (BAS), a disorder common in flat-faced breeds. His shortened snout has left him with an elongated soft palate that obstructs his windpipe, along with narrowed nostrils that severely limit his ability to breathe through his nose.

You can see his stitches—evidence of the surgery he underwent to widen his nostrils. Thanks to procedure, Louie can now breathe more easily.

Gigi was taken to a rural vet clinic to be euthanised as her owner was very unwell—unfortunately, so was Gigi. However, the vet felt she was too beautiful and too young euthanised and instead reached out to BARRC. We quickly organized a group of volunteers to transport her from one location to another until she safely arrived in Bunbury, a 300km trip.



Gigi was diagnosed with immune-mediated thrombocytopenia (ITP), a condition in which the dog's own immune system attacks and destroys its platelets, leading to thrombocytopenia—a dangerously low platelet count. Almost any infection can overstimulate the immune system and trigger ITP. She is now receiving the medical treatment she desperately needed, and every day, her bloodwork continues to improve.

We also have Jamie with his dicky hip, and Marceline, who deserves a story all on her own as it is a long one. Let's save them for our next newsletter and hopefully they will be fighting fit and ready for adoption!

Volunteering for BARRC is a life-changing experience for the animals and a rewarding one for our Foster Carers, Kennel Hands and helpers.


These people are crucial for our operations. We also welcome administrative, media and event helpers.
